Our second Inclusivi-TEA event on 7 November 2025 brought together caregivers, parents, and individuals with special needs for another meaningful evening of connection and support.

This time, the event had two tracks. Caregivers and parents attended an informative talk by Mr Eric Tan, a certified financial planner, on the importance of writing a will and planning for the long-term care of their loved ones with special needs. The session provided practical guidance on how to ensure their children and wards are well cared for even after they themselves are no longer around — a topic that is often difficult but deeply necessary to address.

While the caregivers were learning about legacy and estate planning, our special needs participants enjoyed a lively time of fun and games. They played PLMC Inclusivi-TEA's very own versions of Bingo and Don't Forget the Lyrics, filling the room with laughter, music, and joyful competition. These activities encouraged social interaction, confidence, and self-expression in a relaxed, inclusive setting.

The session ended with smiles all round as caregivers reunited with their loved ones over tea and snacks, sharing what they had learned and experienced. GYM's Christmas “Oldies” Celebration



Stepping out on a mission with the Holy Spirit

In November, a team of six PLMC members, led by Ian Cheah, went on a short-term mission trip to Hong Kong. Partnering with YWAM in the district of Tuen Mun, the group was involved in outreach ministry to cardboard collectors, elderly-at-risk and low-income families. Two trippers share how God shared His heart and spoke to them during this trip.

Before the trip, I tried to think about what I could do on the mission trip. My Cantonese was not very good, and I was only able to speak a little. On the first day of our arrival, we were blessed with good weather. While praying with fellow mission trippers, the Holy Spirit placed in my heart the words that Jesus spoke to His disciples about sowing the seeds of the gospel.

Going out to minister among the cardboard collectors brought a clearer understanding of what Jesus, our Lord, is doing for the needy and hungry families. This is what we are called to do with the talents that He has given us.

The YWAM translators who joined us were a great blessing, not only for their language support but also for their heart for the cardboard collectors. They have been faithfully serving these workers by providing essential items such as hand gloves, bags with soap, towels, and hand cream—practical ways of showing God's love and care for their physical needs, alongside sharing the gospel. Through the weekly food distribution, the cardboard collectors also received items like bento meals, canned food, and bread, thoughtfully meeting their daily needs.

My experience of sharing the Gospel with the cardboard collectors was a blessing in disguise. Initially, I was shy and hesitant, but as I stepped out to share, I felt strengthened and encouraged. My shyness became a catalyst for growth, allowing me to rely more on God's strength and less on my own. It was a reminder that sharing the gospel is not about me, but about the message and the people I am sharing it with. – Jeffrey Yeo

Seeing God Move on the Mission Field



Indeed, God works beyond what we can think or imagine. During our visit to elderly-at-risk residents living in public rental flats, the first lady we visited opened her heart to receive Christ and expressed eagerness to attend a local church. Amazingly, the second lady we visited in a nearby block was already a Christian who goes out almost daily to distribute tracts and share the gospel. When we shared about our earlier visit, she was more than happy to follow up with the lady who had just accepted Christ and to bring her to church.

At the park, we had the opportunity to engage with a man in a wheelchair who was sitting alone by the pond. He shared that he has read about many religions and assured us that he would diligently read every page of the Gospel of Luke and John that we had given him.

I sensed his sincerity in seeking the truth and asked if I could share my testimony of how I came to know the Lord. He listened attentively but declined when we offered to pray for his needs, explaining that he could pray for himself. We told him that we would continue to pray for him to encounter the living God even after we return to Singapore. We believe that the Holy Spirit has touched him and that the Word of God will not return void. We continue to pray and trust that God's mercy will lead this gentleman to salvation, for those who seek Him will find Him.

I am reminded that there are many needy people in Singapore as well, just like those we met on our mission trip. I pray that God will open my eyes and heart and give me the boldness to share His love whenever the opportunity arises. – Dawn Teo (top picture third from right)
